



THE ROLE OF AFFIXES IN WORD FORMATION AND THEIR IMPACT ON ENGLISH LANGUAGE STRUCTURE

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This article is a study of the role of affixes in word formation. The study examines two types of affixes: inflectional affixes. In this study, we will examine what these affixes do to create words, indicate grammar, and add meaning to words. By comparing languages, the study shows how affixes help languages create words, increase their vocabulary, and become more flexible in terms of syntax. The results show that affixes don't just change the structure of words. They also tell us something about the people who use language and the types of language they use. The study shows that affixes are important in understanding language learning and in learning how language develops.

Affixes are really important, in word formation. They help create words and change the meanings of existing ones. Derivation and inflection are two processes that use affixes. Derivation helps create words, inflection helps express relations. The use of affixes shows how a languages vocabulary grows and changes. It also reflects the languages system. Studying affixes helps us understand how form and meaning are connected. We can also learn about the characteristics of languages. Affixes play a role in this. They help us see how languages are structured. Language structure and affixes are closely linked.

This study looks at how affixes help form words and how they affect the way the English language is organized. The research uses ideas from books about morphology and word formation well as real life examples of how people use English today. To analyze this the study uses words with prefixes and suffixes from English dictionaries, grammar books and real texts like academic papers, books and things you see in the media. The study includes two kinds of affixes: affixes like un-, re-, -ness, -tion and -er which help make new words and inflectional affixes, like -s -ed, -ing, -er and -est which help change the form of words. This helps to get a picture of how words are formed in the English language and how English affixes work.

The primary method applied in the study is morphological analysis, which allows for identifying, classifying, and systematizing affixes according to their structural position and grammatical function. Through this method, affixes are examined in terms of their productivity, distribution, and contribution to lexical expansion. Structural analysis is also employed to determine how affixation influences word class transformation and syntactic behavior, particularly the way derivational suffixes shift grammatical categories and affect sentence structure.

In addition, semantic analysis is used to explore meaning modification caused by affixation, including processes such as negation, repetition, intensification, abstraction, and agent formation. By comparing base forms with their derived counterparts, the research identifies regular semantic patterns and evaluates their impact on conceptual development within the language system.



We will use corpus-based observational data to examine how people use English. This will help us see how often people use words with affixes in English. We use a combination of methods to study English, including looking at the structure of words, their meaning, and how they are used in relation to other words. The methods we use are morphological, structural and semantic, comparative, and corpus-based. This will give us a framework for studying the importance of affixes and how they affect the English language.

English uses something called affixation. This happens when prefixes or suffixes are added to a part of a word. Affixation is very important to how the English language is formed and how it changes over time. It helps us create words and understand their meaning. We can add something to the beginning or end of a word to change its meaning. It's part of how the English language works. Understanding affixation is important if you want to know how English words are formed and how they can change their meaning¹.

Affixes are usually put into two groups: derivational and inflectional. Derivational affixes change the meaning of the base word or what kind of word it's so they make new words. For example, when you add "un" to "happy" you get "unhappy" which means the opposite. Also, when you add "-ness" to "happy" you get "happiness" which changes an adjective into a noun. On the hand inflectional affixes change the grammar of a word without changing what it means or what kind of word it is. For example, you can add "-s" to make a word plural or add "-ed" to make a verb past tense. Derivational affixes and inflectional affixes are both important, for changing words².

Prefix example:

She became antisocial after the incident.

It is impossible to rewrite history.

His behavior was completely unacceptable.

Suffix example:

The government announced new regulations.

Her kindness brings me great happiness.

The company plans to modernize its system.

1. Derivational affixation

Derivational affixation is when you add prefixes or suffixes to a word to make a new word with a different meaning or type. Derivational prefixes like "anti"-, "pre"- and "dis"- change the meaning of the root words. For example, when you add "anti"- to "social" you get "antisocial" which is a different meaning from the original word social³. In contrast suffixes such as "-ment," "-ation," and "-ize" usually change the type of the base word. For instance, when you add "-ation" to "inform" you get "information" which changes the word inform from a verb to a noun. That is a big difference in the word inform. Derivational affixation and suffixes like these are important to understand because they can completely change the meaning of words, like social and inform.

Derivational affix.

un + happy → unhappy

She felt unhappy after hearing the bad news.

True happiness comes from helping others.

("-ness" sifatni otga aylantirdi.)

anti + social → antisocial

His antisocial behavior made people uncomfortable.

("anti-" ma'noni o'zgartirdi.)

inform + ation → information

I need more information about the project.

("-ation" fe'lni otga aylantirdi.)

-ment (develop → development)

Inflectional affix

a) Plural (-s):

The students are preparing for their exams.

She has two brothers.

b) Past tense (-ed):

She finished her homework yesterday.

They visited the museum last week.

When we add something to a word it can still mean the thing but it can also fit into different sentences⁴. This makes it easier to understand what we are saying. For example, when we add an "s" to the word "dog" we get the word "dogs" which means than one dog. We can also add things like "er" and "est" to words that describe things, like "big" to make them mean something is bigger or the biggest.

3. The role of affixation in language acquisition

Affixation is very important in language learning. This is especially true for non-native speakers. They use patterns that they can recognize to learn words. When students know

affixes, they can understand words they have never seen before. This helps them read better and learn more about the language. For example, if they know that "re"- means to do something, they can understand words like "redo," "rewrite," and "reconstruct." They don't have to learn every word. The "re"- prefix helps them know what the word means. This makes learning the language easier, and students can use it to become better at reading and speaking.

Affixation also aids in developing morphological awareness, which is crucial for literacy skills, such as reading and writing⁵. Studies have shown that learners with strong morphological awareness tend to have better reading comprehension, as they are more adept at recognizing and understanding complex word forms.
